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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a survey of public policies pertaining to environmental, natural resource management and sustainable energy problems in the U.S. and around the world. The course will begin with an overview of the nature of public policies, the policy process and policy analysis. We will then cover the major environmental policies in the U.S., including the Clean Air Act, Clean Water Act, Endangered Species Act, and National Environmental Policy Act, as well as other important topics such as climate change.

- 1. Understand core issues and major topics in the U.S. environmental policy field.
- 2. Gain knowledge about the nature of policymaking and policy analysis.
- 3. Demonstrate competence in environmental policy by using evidence-based materials, critically evaluating information, and writing persuasively on environmental topics.
- 4. Discuss and engage others in a meaningful dialogue about environmental issues.

Assignments

Attendance (10% of final grade): You are expected to attend all class meetings. - **Group/Individual Projects (20% of final grade):** There are project paper and project presentation assignments. <u>Undergraduate students will work in groups</u> to complete these projects, but graduate students will complete them individually.
- **3 Exams (70% of final grade):** There are three exams in total; two mid-term exams and one comprehensive final exam. Choose any location of your choice to take the exam on Canvas. The instructor will be available by email and on Zoom for questions.

- <u>Electronic Submission</u>: All assignments including the three exams must be submitted through Canvas.
- <u>Late Assignment Policy</u>: The deadline for all assignments cannot be extended. Exceptions will be made only under university-approved conditions (e.g. documented serious illness, family emergency or religious obligation).

These readings will help expand your understanding of the key concepts and policy issues and serve as additional materials for your project papers.
